Meet Dr. Allison White, Assistant Director of INST

Where are you from?

I am originally from the Bay Area in California, a place where even the child sitting next to you in a coffee shop can fix your computer if something happens to it! My hometown has changed quite a bit from when I grew up there but there are still enough locals in town to make me feel at home when I'm there. My mother is an oil painter and I have quite



a few of her paintings of the Bay Area in my office on campus.

Describe your research.

My research examines elections under authoritarianism and focuses mostly on the post-Soviet region. I am interested in a variety of big questions, such as how authoritarian regimes preserve power, why autocrats subject themselves to elections, and the causes and consequences of ethnic political mobilization. I enjoy researching phenomena that are illicit and difficult to tackle, like vote buying, ballot-box stuffing, or corruption.

What interests you about International Studies?

I like the fact that it is focused on the world beyond our borders. I have always been interested in what life is like for people outside of the United States and that's what International Studies is all about!

What do you like most about your career?

I like working with students the most. College-age students are in a unique time of their lives and I enjoy witnessing their personal and professional evolutions as they learn more about themselves and the world. I also enjoy integrating them into my own scholarly pursuits as research assistants and advising their independent research for Honors Theses.

What's your favorite class to teach, and why?

Since I am teaching it for the first time this semester, I would say that Research Methods in International Studies is my favorite class to teach because I have been able to assign reading that transcends strict disciplinary boundaries and brings research to life in interesting ways for students. For example, we look at topics like the Russian mafia, FIFA soccer, human trafficking and contemporary slavery, and the Sinaloa drug cartel. I have also added a career component to the course, where students learn about internship and career opportunities related to International Studies through the Career Center at CSU.

What's one thing most students don't know about you?

I am a direct descendent of American pioneers. My ancestors were part of the Donner Party, a group of families who traveled to California by wagon train in the mid-1840s and settled in the state when it was still part of Mexico. The Donner Party is somewhat notorious in American history for cannibalism but my family has assured me that my ancestors (the Breens) did not engage in that type of activity since they rationed their food. I've always wondered whether that's actually true or not!

What is one piece of advice you wish you'd heard as a student?

I wish I had been told that maintaining a healthy lifestyle both physically and mentally are as important, if not more, than academic performance. My GPA came at a cost to myself and I wish, in retrospect, that I had created a more balanced life for myself when I was in college.

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Dr. Allison White is a Political Scientist and has been teaching at Colorado State University since 2015. In Fall 2018, she accepted the new role of Assistant Director of CSU's International Studies Program. This spring, she will serve as Interim Director while the Director of International Studies, Dr. Andrea Duffy, is away on Semester at Sea.

Get Involved in INST Academic Families! A new mentorship opportunity

In Fall 2018, International Studies launched a new mentorship program called Academic Families for current students and alumni to cultivate a robust community within the program and engender

stronger ties to our alumni. In the inaugural semester, forty current students as well as over a dozen alumni from around the world are participating. The alumni participants include several veterans of the U.S. military, the Assistant Director of the Counterterrorism Education Learning Lab (CELL) in Denver, an intelligence analyst in the FBI's Cyber Security Division, and a leader of experiential education trips to Canada, Panama, and China.

In the Academic Families program, firstyear or second-year INST students are paired with each other as "sibling children," and upper-level INST students are



paired with each other as "parents." Parents provide advice and counsel to their children as they navigate their first and second years in the INST major and broader university. INST alumni

act as "grandparents," mentoring parents about life after graduation and potential career paths. Each academic family consists of multiple children, parents, and alumni.

We look forward to growing the Academic Families program in the future and making it a signature initiative in International Studies at CSU. We hope that parents will become grandparents when they graduate and that more alumni will forge relationships with current students through their participation.
